The Photography of Yip Cheong Fun was an exhibition jointly organised

by the Singapore Heritage Society and the National Library Board, Singapore, held at the National Library from 15 March to 15 May 2006. This publication was produced as a companion catalogue to the exhibition. It captures Singapore's



changing landscape and people through the eyes of awardwinning photographer Mr Yip Cheong Fun.

Yip's historically vivid images of Chinatown and early coastal villages document a past landscape that is no longer visible or imaginable. Much of his work revolves around religious practices, events, celebrations and activities of a bygone era, and gives a spirited overview of Yip's aesthetic and watchfulness. From being there at the right time, engaging the subject, choosing the right technique to the final shutter snap, each image contains within itself a striking yet subtly balanced composition. Together, they form a veritable record of the unique art of a master photographer, and also provide a nostalgic look at Singapore's disappearing past.

Emerging Scholars, which was organised by the Department of History, NUS and hosted by the National Library Board, Singapore. The workshop brought together 10 scholars from a variety of academic disciplines, including sociology, history, political science, education studies and archaeology, to address two issues - new approaches to understanding Singapore's past; and the untapped sources of information for the writing of Singapore's history.

Going beyond the established storylines and heroes, several papers delve into the culture and contributions of groups that played a key role in parts of Singapore's growth, from churches and Malay organisations to films.

These papers are by no means authoritative works. Instead, they represent perspectives of an emerging generation of scholars who would inevitably view Singapore's past through very different lenses from those adopted by their predecessors. This publication provides a glimpse into the future possibilities of the historiography of Singapore.







Filled with colourful photographs and illustrations, the thread-bound book takes readers through the establishment of the Ming dynasty and Emperor Yongle's ascendancy to the throne, as well as the birth of famed Chinese explorer Zheng He and his rise to Grand Eunuch.



ancient Chinese shipbuilding and navigation techniques, including the use of navigation chart and water compass. It describes how the ports of call visited by Zheng He - including Southeast Asia, South Asia, Middle East and East Africa - why the voyages eventually ended and why China decided to withdraw from international trade and diplomatic relations.

Zheng He's voyages have left a lasting legacy as well as made a significant impact on Singapore's history and development. This book also contains a segment on the early history of Singapore, as well as descriptions of the now-defunct rock outcrops at Labrador Park - the Longyamen (Dragon Teeth Gate), which served as a navigation marker for Zheng He's fleet.





On 17 May 2007, the National Library Board organised its first in a series of colloquia on "Managing Change: Singapore in a Larger Asia" with the Asia Competitiveness Institute, Lee Kuan Yew School of Public Policy, National University of Singapore. The event was graced by keynote speakers, Dr Surin Pitsuwan, former Foreign Minister of Thailand, and Professor Philippe Lasserre, Emeritus Professor of Strategy and Asian Business, INSEAD.

Dr Surin Pitsuwan shared insights on managing change in Asia within the framework of ASEAN as well as from

Singapore's perspective. He noted 'all roads in ASEAN lead to Singapore' and to the rest of the region'. This can be seen both as a blessing and a responsibility for Singapore, posing a very challenging prospect. ASEAN and its 500 million people are at different stages of development, with different political systems, cultures, religions, and values. Meanwhile, Singapore has always played by the rule of law and planned for its consistent growth. The challenge for Singapore therefore is to drive positive changes without making the rest of ASEAN feel left behind. He emphasised the importance of Singapore-based NGO's contributing to the region to better the lives of ASEAN citizens.

In meeting new challenges, Professor Philippe Lasserre suggested that Singapore adopt a more bottom-up approach, particularly in a business environment where creativity and innovation are crucial in order to sustain business



success and a competitive edge. Professor Lasserre presented Singapore's success strategy from his point of view. The four

components making up the framework are ambition (achievement of mission statement), organisations (agencies driving the process), capabilities (developing the enablers), and positioning (achieving the targets).

This was followed by an

economic panel and a social panel discussion. The economic panelists raised several challenges and recommended that Singapore's contribution to the region could come in the form of value-adding towards the region's growth and development. Singapore can be a facilitator between the Arabs and international businessmen on the one hand, and ASEAN on the other, especially because of expanding business interest in Asia. The Economic Panel was chaired by Associate



Prof Philippe Lasserre, Emeritus Professor of Strategy and Asian Business, INSEAD, delivering the second keynote address

Professor Euston Quah, Head of Economics, Nanyang Technological University, with panelists Mr Jim Baker, author of *The Eagle in the Lion City: America, Americans and Singapore*, Professor Lasserre and Mr Bouchaib Silm, Research Analyst, Middle East Expert.

The social panel raised issues

pertaining to environmental, energy and human security. They reflected on opportunities for Singapore to ride on the current sizzling classical music wave in China. On culture, the panelists felt that it ought to be promoted subtly and whilst stereotyping is common, it can lead to polarisation. Professor Amitav Archarya of the S. Rajaratnam School of International Studies chaired the social panel. The panelists comprised Dr Geh Min, President of the Nature Society of Singapore, Ms Min Lee, a renowned Singaporean violinist and Mr Dilip Mukerjea, Managing Director, Braindancing International.

The colloquia also saw the launch of two of National Library's publications, *Statistical Snapshots of Asia-Pacific Countries and National Directory of Scholars: Humanities and Social* 

Sciences. Professor Neo Boon Siong, Director, Asia Competitiveness Institute, Lee Kuan Yew School of Public Policy, National University of Singapore, co-launched Statistical Snapshots with the colloquia's Guest of Honour, Mr Yatiman Yusof, and National Library Distinguished Reader and Ms Ngian Lek Choh, Director, National Library. Associate

## **EXHIBITIONS AT THE NATIONAL LIBRARY**

Exhibitions have formed part of the regular landscape of the National Library since it was re-opened in July 2005. A total of 70 exhibitions were showcased from July 2005 to March 2007 attracting over 931,000 visitors. Of these, two are permanent exhibitions focusing on the story of the National Library and the literary heritage of Singapore. *The Zheng He and Maritime Asia* exhibition was presented from August 05 to February 2006 to commemorate the 600<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Zheng He voyages to Southeast Asia.

Aksara: The Passage of Malay Scripts, which traced the different writing systems used in the Malay world, from the ancient Indic scripts of Pallava and Kawi to the more modern Jawi and Roman scripts, was staged from January to June 2007.

Others include *Singapore Honours*, an exhibition in collaboration with Eng Leong Medallic Industries Pte Ltd (ELM), which showcased the complete awards of the Prime Minister's Office and the various uniformed services of Singapore.

Imprints of the Past: Remembering the 1966 Woodcut Show displayed the original 1966 woodblock prints, which were exhibited at the old Stamford Road National Library 40 years ago.

The Lim Boon Keng: A Life to Remember exhibition was jointly organised with the Settlement of Dr Lim Boon Keng (1921) and Singapore Heritage Society. It featured the multifaceted life of Dr Lim Boon Keng and presented issues on identity, ideals and social problems of Singapore and Chinese Society during his lifetime.

Exhibitions add a different dimension to enrich visitor experience

and also to stimulate research. More importantly it creates opportunities for partnerships with organisations of mutual interests and objectives, to enhance knowledge and to strengthen the network of experts and institutions.

This is an opportune moment to record our acknowledgement and appreciation to all our partners for their assistance, support and sponsorship for all the exhibitions held at the National Library.

We are also very encouraged by the feedback from our visitors. Thank you and keep the comments coming for our future exhibitions!

# THE NATIONAL LIBRARY BOARD AND RAFFLES INSTITUTION SIGN A MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

The National Library Board and Raffles Institution (RI) signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) on 26 April 2007 to formulate a strategic partnership in the provision of RI's collection of rare documents to the public, and to the research and literary communities in particular. The collection comprises over 100 documents, which include original letters written by Sir Stamford Raffles. They include personal letters, music scores and photographs, pertaining to the Singapore Institution



(now known as Raffles Institution). They cover topics from the establishment of the Singapore Institution to annual reports, funding appeals and e m p l o y m e n t applications. The



letters date back as early as 1823 and Sir Stamford Raffles' letters in particular, are a welcome addition to the National Library's existing collection of Raffles' other letters.

The National Library will provide the rare materials preservation and storage facilities for the collection and at the same time, make these materials available to the public through digitisation." With access to such rare materials, we hope that it contributes to creating a greater awareness of our nation's shared history and heritage, and in the process, build our sense of rootedness in the modern fast-paced world we live in today", said Ms Ngian Lek Choh, Director, National Library.

The MOU provides an avenue to preserve the rich history of RI. Said Mr Koh Chin Nguang, Headmaster, Raffles Institution, "As we leverage on the strengths of the National Library in preserving and yet making heritage materials available to the public, RI is pleased to do its part in contributing to our society and hopes that other organisations and individuals with heritage materials will do the same in building up our sense of national history and pride."
